


# Travelling in the Yukon?

Guests travelling anywhere in the Yukon are visiting the traditional territories of a First Nation or the Inuvialuit. In visiting these areas, **you are taking on a responsibility and duty** to show respect and gratitude for its stewards, as well as the land, water, and animals.

## Know the nations on whose lands you travel on

- ✓ Whose land are you visiting?
- ✓ Learn about its history and culture
- ✓ Check and respect rules, restrictions, or permit requirements set by specific First Nations

## Treat the land, water, and animals with care and respect

- ✓ Give wildlife space
- ✓ Minimize your impact
- ✓ Reduce speed when using motorized vehicles
- ✓ Keep wildlife attractants contained
- ✓ Limit drone use

## Leave no trace

- ✓ Pack it in, pack it out
- ✓ Leave everything as you find it
- ✓ Prevent wildfire
- ✓ Keep campfires small, at least 3 m from plants, and never unattended
- ✓ Minimize the spread of invasive species

## Give thanks to the land in your own way

- ✓ Express gratitude
- ✓ Reflect on what you learned

## Share your journey

- ✓ Engage with the community
- ✓ Name the nations
- ✓ Use traditional place names
